PATTERN DEMONSTRATION

Tyer: Dave Murray
Pattern: Rocky's Dragon

Hook: Mustad Curved Nymph, #10 to #8

Thread: Olive 6/0

Ribbing: Extra fine copper wire Body: Olive Sparkle Dub Overbody: Peasant tail fullback

Hackle: Grizzly hen

Eyes: Black plastic bead chain

Comments: I'm not sure if this is a real name of if it's Dave's tribute to our eldest member. It should prove an interesting pattern either way.

OCTOBER 13TH

PATTERN DEMONSTRATION

Tyer: Lance Taylor

Topic: Techniques For Spinning Hair Bodies

Pattern #1: Goddard Caddis



Hook: Mustad 94840 or 94833

Thread: Tan. 6/0.

Body: Natural caribou (or Deer Hair),

spun and trimmed to resemble a winged adult

Caddis fly.

Antennae: Brown hackle stems. Hackle: Brown hackle.

Pattern #2: Irresistible Adams



Hook: Mustad 94840 or 94833

Thread: Gray 3/0.

Tail: Deer or Moose body hairBody: Spun Deer Hair.Wing: Grizzly Hackle Tips

Hackle: Dark Brown Rooster Neck or Saddle Hackle.

Comments: Spinning and shaping deer hair is oldschool, and it takes a little practice to get the hair to spin and pack properly. Once mastered though, you can also tie a wide assortment of Pike Flies, Hoppers, and Muddler Minnows with this technique.

Pattern: Muir Lake Special Caddis Larva

Hook: Mustad 9672 #14 to #10

Thread: Brown 6/0 or 8/0

Bead: Copper bead sized to hook

Tag: Brown tinsel Body: Brown chenille

Head: White wool (if desired)

Thorax: Peacock herl

Comments: D.

Pattern: Micro Stone

Hook: Mustad 9672 #16 to #12

Thread: Black 8/0

Bead: Brass bead sized to hook
Tail: Black goose biots

Body: Small black rubber hackle
Thorax: Peacock herl of black dubbing
Legs: Small black rubber hackle

Antennae: Black goose biots

Comments: Bob good-naturedly takes all our ribbing about his wading prowess and still volunteers to demo a couple of his goto patterns. Come on out and give "Bobber" a warm reception.
