Coastal Indian Planked Salmon

This unusual method of preparing Salmon keeps it moist and full of flavour. The native Indians of the Pacific Northwest used cedar planks as a cooking platform and as a source of infused taste and aroma. The cedar can be purchased at any building supply store. Make sure it is untreated wood.

Ingredients:

1 to 2 sides fresh salmon (filleted), 1 cup vegetable oil

1 cup soy sauce, 1 tablespoon brown sugar

1 inch piece finely minced ginger, 3 minced garlic cloves

1 jigger bourbon or Rum (which I prefer)

1 bunch green onions (garnish), cedar planks to suit fish

Method:

- 1. Mix the oil, soy, sugar, ginger garlic and bourbon together in a bowl. Stir until the sugar is dissolved.
- 2. Let the salmon soak in this over night. At the same time soak the cedar planks in water over night.
- 3. Heat BBQ to a medium heat and place the salmon on the plank and onto the BBQ. Keep a spray bottle of water handy because the plank will catch fire while cooking!
