Comments: Bring your photos and stories and regale your buddies with your summer fishing. We'll also be talking about the upcoming fall program, so bring ideas as well

SEPTEMBER 14TH

PATTERN DEMONSTRATION

Tier: Dave Murray Pattern: Peacock Nymph

Hook: Mustad 9671 or 9672 - #8 to #12 Thread: Black 6/0 (140 denier) or 8/0 (70 denier)

Tail shuck Red Wool

Under Body: Black sewing thread (longest you can find)

Body & Thorax: Peacock herl

Wing Case: Black Sewing interface or mottled turkey quill

Head: Tying thread

Pattern: Griffiths Gnat

Hook: Mustad C72 Dry Fly - #12 to #18

Thread: Black 8/0
Body: Peacock herl
Hackle: Grizzly Saddle

Optional Wing: Fluorescent Orange poly

Head: Tying thread

Comments: These are the first of our "Beginner Flys" for the fall. They are simple patterns but have proven effective on many waters, not the least of which is the Little Smoky.

SEPTEMBER 21ST

PATTERN DEMONSTRATION

Tier: Tom Gaunt
Pattern: SLF Caddis
Hook: #10 to ? Scud Hook

Thread: White or Cream & Brown or Black 8/0

Abdomen: Fiery Orange SLF Dubbing

Sheath: Clear Swiss Straw
Legs: Partridge or Brown Hen
Thorax: Dark brown SLf Dubbing
Antennae: Bronze Mallard wing quill fibres

Comments: Tom is the owner of Rocky Mountain Flys, which carries a line of unusual bird feathers and materials. He will demonstrate a pattern that uses some of those materials.

SEPTEMBER 28TH

PATTERN DEMONSTRATION

Tier: Dennis Southwick

Pattern: Holographic Backswimmer
Hook: Mustad 9671, #10 to #16

Thread: Black 6/0 or 8/0
Back: Black Foam
Body: Holographic yarn
Legs: Rubber Hackle

Comments: Dennis invented this pattern last year specifically for Muir Lake and it proved to be a killer. I tested it out again recently and it still works.
