FISHING AND HUNTING LICENCE ISSUING PRIVATIZED AND IMPROVED

Government of Alberta News Release

For immediate release: Thursday, September 4, 1997

Edmonton -- Alberta Environmental Protection announced today it has entered into an agreement with Information Systems Management Corporation (ISM), a subsidiary of the IBM Global Services organization, for ISM to manage the sale of Alberta recreational fishing and hunting licences. ISM will develop and implement an automated system to integrate all services required to manage the sale of these licences. The new licencing system will enable Environmental Protection to concentrate resources on fish and wildlife management and the enforcement of regulations.

"This agreement reflects the changing role of government," said Ty Lund, Minister of Environmental Protection. "It is consistent with the stated goal of Environmental Protection's business plan to permit the private sector to deliver those services to the public for which it is better suited."

The Alberta government will invest no money in the development of the new system or in its operation. All costs associated with the development and operation of the new system will be recovered by ISM through a transaction within the current pricing structure for all licenses.

Beginning March 18, 1998, all recreational fishing and hunting licences will be sold through private licence issuers using automated terminals similar to those used for credit/debit card transactions. Issuers will be able to confirm licence eligibility on-line and licences will be printed at the point of sale. ISM will be responsible for all aspects of the new system, including management of the network of private licence issuers, such as sporting goods outlets and community stores.

Hunters and anglers can expect to be better served by the new system. The new system will be faster and will track all pertinent information on every hunter or angler holding a hunting or fishing licence. Private licence issuers will be able to sell licences to the public using a more efficient system that requires less "hands-on" administration.

To enable creation of the licensing database, hunters and anglers will be required to purchase a new Wildlife Identification Number (WIN) card at a cost of \$8.00 before buying any licence, beginning in March, 1998. The WIN card will be valid for five years and renewable for an additional five years at a cost of \$4.00 (or a cost of \$1.20/year over the ten year period). Licence information for each individual licensee will be coordinated digitally using the WIN. This will mean both the purchaser and the issuer will have immediate access to information on the validity of the purchase and what licences the purchaser already holds.

"This initiative with Alberta Environmental Protection gives us the opportunity to develop and implement a unique information systems solution," said Normand Bourassa, President and CEO, ISM. "We look forward to providing a more efficient service to hunters, anglers and private licence issuers throughout the province."

ISM employs over 800 people in Alberta and is the province's largest provider of information management services. ISM is a wholly owned subsidiary of IBM Canada Ltd., and an integral member of the worldwide IBM Global Services organization.

Background: New Fishing and Hunting Licence System

The agreement between Alberta Environmental Protection and Information Systems Management Corporation (ISM), effective March 18, 1998, is unique among North American jurisdictions. ISM will integrate all services required to manage the sale of recreational fishing and hunting licences to the public.

ISM will manage a network of private licence issuers using an automated point-of-sale system. Private licence issuers, equipped with terminals similar to those used for credit/debit card transactions, will be able to confirm licence eligibility on-line and to produce licences at the point of sale.

Benefits to Government

- Enhanced data collection for wildlife and fisheries management and resource use.
- Improved resource management through a client identification database of all hunters and anglers.
- Convenient, efficient access to the database of routine client information, current at the time of purchase.
- Efficient access to the licencing database by Enforcement Officers, enabling more effective enforcement
 of wildlife and fisheries regulations.
- Reduced printing, distribution and administration costs.

Benefits to Anglers and Hunters

- Improved and faster service and streamlined licence documents.
- Improved service through confirmation of eligibility at point and time of sale -- virtually eliminating licensing errors.

Benefits to Private Licence Vendors

- · Reduced licence issuing time-through automated licence machines.
- Elimination of licensing errors.
- Increased volume of sales as private vendors will issue 100% of recreational sportfishing and hunting licences.

 Currently, 90 percent of recreational sportfishing licences and 50 percent of hunting licences are privately issued.

ADDITIONAL INFORMATION

- "The Sportfishing Licence sales are down about 30,000 over the last five or so years."
- "The Wildlife Certificate sales are down from an all-time high of about 167,000 in 1980-81. The drop has plateaued in the last few years at around 100,000 -- but has continued a slow fall in numbers over the last couple of years.
- "Reasons for drop: reduced recruitment of youth to these particular sports (i.e., as a group anglers and hunters are aging); urbanization of
 our society; increase in single-parent families; many more choices in recreational opportunities; and of course, increase in fees and complexity of regulations -- not to mention the hurdles one must jump to obtain a firearm the case of hunting)."
- "In 1996-97, exactly 220,415 Sportfishing Licences and 96,655 Wilidlife Certificates were issued."
- "ISM preliminary research estimates that 30-40% less outlets will actually sell licences next year."
- "ISM will get \$6 from every licence sold BOTH fishing and hunting licences, in addition to the \$8 you have to pay to get the WIN card (renewable every 5 years). The \$6 ISM will get breaks down to \$2.50 from Buck For Wildlife funds (that is 1/4 of the \$10) and \$3.50 from the government's share."
