Don Andersen says the "rod is a 7'9" 5 weight 3 piece scalloped hollowed rod c/w aluminum rod tube and cloth bag. The rod is a 6-strip rod hand-crafted by me in my Rocky Mountain House, Alberta shop. This rod is the latest in about 300 rods built over the past 40+ years... Over those years nearly 10% of the rods crafted have been donated to Trout Unlimited Canada to aid in the conservation of Trout and their habitats.

The rod features include a downlocking reel seat, premium cork handle, ceramic stripper guides, and Hopkins and Holloway snake and tip-top guides. The ferrules are Classic Sporting Enterprises Super Z.

Hook: 3X long hook of your choice

Thread: Black 6/0
Tail: grizzly fibers
Rib: silver tinsel
Body: black wool
Beard: grizzly fibers
Wing: pheasant tail fibers
Head: several peacock hurls

Royal Wulff (parachute)

Hook: #8-20 dry fly hook of your choice

Thread: red 8/0
Tail: moose hair
Body: peacock hurl

Segment: red single-strand floss, Wing: white calf tail or poly

Hackle: either grizzly brown or grizzly

Film Critic (Haystack) Bob Quigley Pattern

Hook: 18-8 Ahrex super dry or any dry fly curved hook Thread: 18/0 or 12/0 Nano thread color of your choice

Tail: coq-de Leon fibers Rib: extra fine copper wire,

Body: super fine dub color of choice Wing: white poly or Antron yarn,

Thorax: super fine dub same as body or slightly darker,

Hackle: dry fly color of your choice.

50/50 Streamer (my 50/50, there are others out there)

Hook: any streamer hook 3 or 4X of your choice #12 or bigger,

Thread: 6/0

Materials: can be Kreinex, Krystal Flash, or Flashabou colors your choice,

Eyes: lead dumbbell color & size your choice.

Charing is Caring

Fly Fishing Through The Ice

Fly casting may be just about over for another season but there's no reason to stop fly fishing. Many of those fly patterns that served you well throughout spring, summer, and fall can be equally as effective in winter. The nymphs, scuds, minnows, and bloodworms that were food for fish all through the summer are still there in the winter and the fish still need to eat.

For some tips on winter fly-fishing there's an article that you might find interesting - Ice Fishing with Flies

It focuses on BC's interior lakes but most of the information is equally relevant to Alberta's lakes and stocked ponds. You won't need waders or a flyrod but those flies you used in June may be just as effective in January! And there's much to be learned from looking down the hole you've drilled through the ice and watching how those fish approach and take or refuse what you're offering at the end of your line.

Fly Of The Month



Pumpkinhead

This is a very effective version of a woolly bugger invented by John Kent. The orange bead-head, green tail and body, and orange hackle are the only constants in this fly that can be tied with a variety of materials and additions.

The Standard tie is:

Hook: streamer hook 6-14 Thread: 6/0 colour of your choice

Bead: orange glass bead

Tail: green or olive marabou

Body: green or olive chenille or dubbing

Hackle: burnt orange

Here are some variations incorporating a curved hook, double beads, a steelhead-type wing, and a clear bead.











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
